

HOMEWORK POLICY June 2016

1. The Purposes of Homework

To encourage independent learning through ownership and responsibility.

To allow practice, consolidation and extension of work done in lessons.

To allow assessment of student progress and understanding.

To encourage research skills, for example, in using libraries and other learning resources including ICT.

To provide opportunities for parental communication and involvement and dialogue.

2. Amount of Homework

We recognise that the amount of time spent by students doing homework will vary considerably from one individual to another.

It is not realistic to set prescribed limits as much depends on the age and progress of an individual class or student. However, as a broad guideline we expect the amount of time most students spend doing homework to increase gradually from Year 7 onwards as illustrated below:

Years 7, 8 & 9 recommended 1 hour per day Years 10-11 a minimum of 2 hours per day

The amount of time a student in Year 10 or 11 spends may, on some occasions, go beyond this range depending upon GCSE coursework and revision for modular or terminal examinations.

Appendix 1 details subject specific requirements regarding the expected time a student should spend completing their homework activities.

3. Student Organisers/Homework Diaries

To promote independent learning and help students develop responsibility for managing their homework, organisers/diaries are issued at the start of each academic year.

Students use the organisers/diaries to record homework and these are checked systematically by tutors each week. Parents are asked to sign the organisers/diaries weekly.

Students are expected to replace lost or damaged organisers/diaries.

4. Meeting Deadlines

Students are expected to complete and hand in homework on the day requested by the teacher.

Parents have an important role to play in checking that deadlines have been met.

Teachers will consider sympathetically reasons given for not completing homework and suggest strategies for meeting deadlines. However, where a student repeatedly fails to hand in homework, a detention, either at lunchtime or after school, will be issued in the first instance by the subject teacher. After school detentions require 24 hours notice to parents. In addition a letter or phone call to a parent may be used.

Where homework is very untidy or does not reach a satisfactory standard for that student then the teacher may expect the homework to be repeated with possible sanctions outlined in the referral ladder (Appendix 2).

5. Rewards and Target Setting

The value of homework is recognised through the rewards system established at subject level; for example in the use of praise, positive reward and letters of achievement.

Homework is recognised by the teacher and student at the subject review and may be identified as an appropriate target for future development.

6. Homework Tasks

Exam questions

Whenever possible students should be given homework which is appropriate to their needs.

Leaflets/pamphlets

Homework should be linked to current study programmes and be seen as useful and relevant to the work being done in class.

Possible homework tasks could include:

Investigations Research Resourcing
Skills reinforcement Revision Learning vocabulary

7. Feedback to Parents and Students

When requested students and parents can expect prompt and appropriate feedback on homework. They can expect effective marking and a response to the quality of the work.

8. The Role of Parents

The school expects parents to support the homework policy in the following ways:

Encourage and praise their children for the effort they have given to their homework in order to promote independent learning.

Where possible, provide a peaceful and suitable environment in which students can do their homework.

Monitor the amount of homework set and report any problems to the school.

Check that homework has been completed and deadlines have been met.

Check and sign the homework planner every week.

Support for the teacher when sanctions are used.

Encourage the use of ICT and other resources such as libraries and museums.

Use homework as a prompt to talk to children about their work/topics and other school issues.

9. The Role of Teachers

Teachers set differentiated homework tasks, where appropriate, and mark homework regularly in accordance with published timetables.

Teachers take appropriate action, if necessary in consultation with parents and other staff, to ensure homework is completed (as detailed in Appendix 2 - Homework Referral Ladder).

Teachers maintain a list of homework tasks and a record for all students in order to monitor completion of homework and progress.

10. Review of Homework Policy

The School Homework Policy is reviewed on a regular basis by Senior Management.

The school homework audit, which involves teachers, parents and students, is used to inform future homework policy.

Initial Homework Issues

Dealt with by class teacher on individual basis (through use of extra time given or detentions)

Maximum of 3 issues before referral

Referral to Pastoral Teams

Referral to SEN, tutor and homework club (to determine if additional support is needed) Class teacher to monitor to see if issues resolved

Maximum of 3 issues before referral

HoD Detention

Referral to HoD to action
Letter home + full lunch detention issued by HoD
HoY Progress and Tutor informed
Student Support Services informed for detention
to be logged on Progresso

SLT/HT Detention

After school detention letter issued
HoY Progress contacts parent –
Invited to attend a meeting to resolve the issues
